FEATURED SPEAKERS:



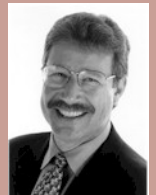
DIANA CHAPMAN WALSH, the twelfth President of Wellesley College, has led the college in a number of new initiatives, including curriculum revision and expanded programs in experiential and service learning. Other important innovations include the development of the Religious and Spiritual Life Program. She has written, edited, and co-edited numerous articles and 14 books.

SUSAN KOMIVES is a senior scholar at the Leadership Academy and an associate professor for the College Student Personnel Program in the College of Education at the University of Maryland. She is a co-author of *Exploring Leadership: For College Students Who Want to Make a Difference* and the fourth edition of *Student Services: A Handbook for the Profession*.



ROBERT J. NASH is a professor of Integrated Professional Studies at the University of Vermont, Burlington and a member of the Editorial Board of *Religion and Education*. Nash's scholarship investigates the relationships between applied ethics, moral and character education, and religious or spiritual belief. Nash has written over 100 articles, chapters, and monographs for major professional journals.

BARRY S. POSNER, Dean of the Leavey School of Business at Santa Clara University, is the co-author of the award-winning and best-selling leadership book *The Leadership Challenge: How to Keep Getting Extraordinary Things Done in Organizations*. Posner is an internationally renowned scholar who has published more than 80 research and practitioner-oriented articles.

ARTHUR CHICKERING is a Visiting Distinguished Professor at the Vermont College, Norwich University. He is a University Professor of Educational Leadership and Human Development and author of several publications, including *Education and Identity* and *Getting the Most Out of College*.



LIESA STAMM is director of the Civic Engagement Cluster Project at the University of Massachusetts, Boston. Her areas of expertise include public school education and educational reform, enhancing teachers' professional development, children's welfare, and adult education.

We are proud to announce the fifteenth annual Institute on College Student Values, a national conference that focuses on research and educational strategies for promoting moral, spiritual, and civic learning in college. The Institute includes featured speakers, workshops, roundtable discussions, exhibits, and special presentations on the research, leadership, and educational strategies used by colleges and universities to promote holistic development of moral and civic capacities in their students.

What is the Institute?


The Institute on College Student Values is an annual conference for academic and student affairs administrators, faculty, students, campus chaplains, and other individuals interested in moral, spiritual, and civic learning in college. First held in 1991, the Institute addresses four broad areas of college student learning and development:

- Moral and spiritual learning and development
- Civic learning and commitment
- Trends in college students' values, spirituality, beliefs, and behaviors
- Ethical issues in college life

The Institute provides opportunities to learn about the most current issues, research, and educational strategies for encouraging moral, spiritual, and civic learning in college. The Institute is a particularly good setting to bring institutional teams of faculty, staff, and students to work together on ways to promote character development.

Call For Programs

We are accepting proposals that address topics related to spirituality and moral and civic learning in college. Program proposals that address college leadership programs, ethics, and spirituality are especially invited. Submissions should include a 75-word abstract* and must be received by **October 15, 2004**, to be considered. Presenters will be notified of acceptance via email by November 21, 2004. The Turnbull Conference Center is wheelchair accessible. Please notify the Institute staff two weeks prior to the conference if special arrangements or assistance are needed.

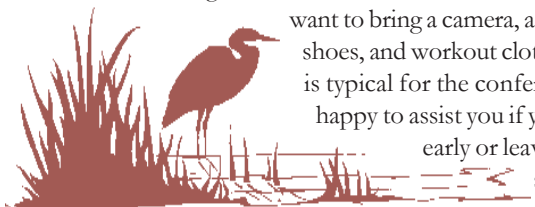
Vegetarian meals will be offered throughout the conference. If you have other special dietary needs, please indicate so when registering for the Institute.

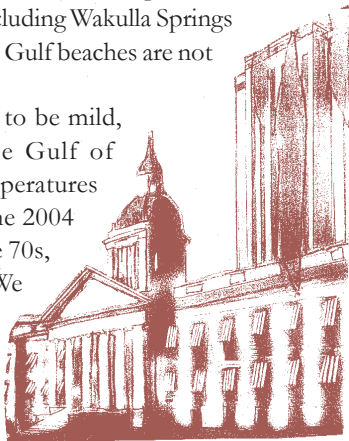
TALLAHASSEE...

Not too far from the crowds of Central Florida, lies another welcoming place in the Sunshine State. This is the Florida with Southern charm and hospitality.

Located in the Big Bend of the Florida panhandle, Tallahassee is nestled between the Gulf Coast and the Georgia border and is surrounded by coastal wetlands, including Wakulla Springs and Apalachicola National Forest. Gulf beaches are not far from Tallahassee.

The climate in February tends to be mild, thanks to our proximity to the Gulf of Mexico, so February daytime temperatures are usually in the 50s and 60s. The 2004 Institute had sunny weather in the 70s, but the weather can also be chilly. We encourage you to check daily weather reports when preparing for the Institute (or simply contact us).
